



Message from the Curator

I am very happy to present "Parallel angles of existence ... and I think to myself what a wonderful world" as a farewell event to our friends in Victoria; a Kaleidoskope of artistic photographs by eminent photographer Margit Selg-Anagnostopoulos. It is an exhibition dedicated on the one hand to the beauty of this terrestrial and cosmic world and on the other hand, to the necessity and the urgency for a deeper reflection and posture of life based on harmony and love.

In fact, such an introspection will enable each one of us to rediscover love and those precious values we have through the years forgotten, such as modesty, respect for the Divine Creation, a sense of a new solidarity, less possessiveness, less consumerism, less economism. Instead, a new sense of togetherness, rediscovering that on this Earth there is ample space for each one of us, for all creatures such as humans, animals and plants and understanding the wise cosmic architecture which rests on balance and mutual respect.

I don't think that any other generation has began feeling this ecumenical duty to stand up to a persistent and enormous ecological challenge threatening the entire creation and obliging us to accept responsibility for the future generations to come. For the first time, I think that we discover that the need for harmony with all the components of nature, is primarily our moral contribution to humanity's future through a global approach, via a renewed humanism who respects divinity and understands the place and the role of man in the universe, not as a master but as a human being.

I had the opportunity to come across the artistry of the lens of Margit and I feel that a lens is the best expression of photography as descriptive art, encompassing all the details of a situation in terms of dimensions and characteristics.

Starting with the beauty of animals, one feels the purity and innocence of these creatures and our duty is not only to treat them with love and respect by recognizing their rights, but also to protect the natural splendour of the ecosystem and

be able to co-exist in harmony with every living creature on earth.

Our humanism entails particular care for them; not only affection to pets such as dogs and cats, but also to farmed and wild animals, as well as concern for the training practices which make them objects for a spectacle in order to please Man.

I also loved Margit's lens depicting beautiful natural scenery either in Australia or Europe and I felt that we are graced by God with the beautiful colours and the serenity of the landscapes whose vibes make us feel internally happy and content.

It is so important to respect Nature and preserve her balance. Human activity should not be guided only by economic considerations. Growth must be sustainable. And in order to be such, we need to be less greedy, less materialistic and more considerate of the impact of our actions on climate, the soil and the rest of the natural resources.

Margit's lens focuses on people as well. All ages, all sexes. What a beautiful creation can Man be! I wonder. No more wars, no more violence!

But, particularly today that humanity is at a crucial crossroads in its history, we need enlightened minds and souls with humility, moderation, discipline, understanding and solidarity in all walks of life; from leaders to followers.

Our technological advances can and must be put to the service of this noble effort to sensitise and mobilise our generation to make the big step forward for the preservation of the environment and its bequest to future generations.

Margit's lens is also about harmony. And you may ask me how can we achieve harmony with nature.

I think this is the best opportunity to make big changes. First of all, we need to stop using material goods as a measurement of merit. We must start longing for a new economic system which is not designed for limitless growth but to meet the real needs of the human community in a sustainable and harmonious way with the global environment. Technology can help us in this pathway with rationality and efficiency and primarily by using renewables.

We need to re-adopt values such as love, kindness, wisdom and beauty, instead of the traditional quest for power and money, egoism, animosity and materialism, which have cost us dearly in terms of suffering and tension.

God has endowed us with his wisdom and on many occasions we forget the simple truth that we were created in His Own Image.


























